Eco Warriors at Chichester Eco Summit



The Chichester Eco Summit was a great success! The 125 Eco Warriors taking part in the day were excited, engaged and enthused about the environment. There was a real buzz about the day with pupils interacting well with the fun activities.

Chichester High School hosted their first Eco Summit event giving a fun day of environmental learning for pupils from Boxgrove Primary; Southway Primary; Tangmere Primary; Southbourne Junior; East Wittering Community Primary and Jessie Younghusband School, along with a number of their own pupils.

Pupils attended a variety of fun and educational workshops throughout the day incluing a Junk Percussion workshop where pupils engaged with the subject of the environment whilst making incredible eco music using unusual junk percussion instruments including barrels, bins and traffic cones! Pupils learnt about Food Miles and the importance of locally produced food in a workshop run by The Southern Co-operative, with guests Montezumas who spoke to pupils about their environmental ethos as well as giving them the opportunity to taste a range of their chocolate during Chocolate week 2017!

Other workshops themes were: International dark skies; producing food in a sustainable system; sun and wind energy; wetland habitats; clothing waste and how we were more sustainable in the past; what happens to waste in West Sussex; and creating artwork using old plastic whilst learning about the issue of plastic in the ocean.

There were also interactive stands where pupils planted bulbs for pollinators in pots made out of newspaper; built Lego models that reflected sustainable living; raced against each other in the sugar supermarket activity; and lit up table lamps with the power of their cycling!

The day ended with a bang with a performance by a number of the Eco Warriors on amazing Junk Percussion instruments.

Member School Feature - Thomas a Becket Junior School

The E.Y.E Project was invited to join eco committee members at Thomas a Becket Junior School for one of their eco club sessions.

It was abundantly clear that the group of 20, year 5&6 pupils, were proud to be on the eco committee and were extremely enthusiastic about their eco club activities. They were proud to wear their new eco committee badges and excited to talk to the E.Y.E Project about eco activities at their school. One of the pupils who has attended an E.Y.E Project Eco Summit expressed "*I love the E.Y.E Project – It's so good!*"

During the lunchtime session, a pupil read the recent diary entry of the eco club mascot, Buster, who reported on the different recycling bins found in Gozo whilst he was on holiday with one of the eco club members. Buster gets to go home with a different pupil each week and reports on his eco adventures in his diary! After hearing about Buster's adventures, the eco club divided up in pairs to avail the act science around the school including classroome, staff officer, tailots and



in pairs to audit the eco signage around the school, including classrooms, staff offices, toilets and corridors. Pupils checked that each area had the correct signs including the school eco code; turn off light signs; turn off water signs; turn off computer signs; recycling monitor name sign; light monitor name sign. They also checked that every classroom had a pen recycling pot. Last year the school recycled 30kg of pens!

Thomas a Becket are a Green Flag Eco School, they have been an Ambassador Eco School and will now be in the Eco Schools Hall of Fame (along with The E.Y.E Project!). They are a large school with around 700 pupils. They run two eco club sessions each week during lunchtimes, one for years 3&4 and the other for years 5&6, with a total of 37 eco committee members. To spread eco engagement across the school there are separate groups of litter rangers and energy rangers (each with around 40 pupils). The rangers carry out their duties once a week during breaktime. There are also recycling and light monitors for every class, so around a quarter of the school are engaged in eco activities at any one time. All Yr 3&4 pupils also enjoy Forest School sessions.

The school takes part in Fairtrade Fortnight; Road Safety week; Walk to School week; Funky Feet Friday; and the E.Y.E Project Eco Summit each year. They are involved with the Learning Through Landscapes Polli:nation Project with other local schools. When asked what their favourite thing about being in the eco club was, one pupil said 'everything' while another told me that no one is persuading them to do it and it is great that so many pupils want to be involved and apply to be an eco-committee member, and another advised that it was the planting and seed bombing.

Pupils advised that they collect milk bottle tops (for Sight Support Worthing); plant flowers; make and throw seed bombs; find animals; draw animals; make homes for bees; enter loads of eco competitions; make items from Fairtrade products for raffles; make eco craft such as collages from magazines and newspapers; and write letters using persuasive writing skills. Some pupils have recently written to Theresa May encouraging her to consider Fairtrade in Brexit negotiations.

The energy rangers award points to classes, for example turning equipment off, and each term the winning class is announced in assembly and the class receives a poster and a pot of treats. There are also prizes for the weirdest thing found by a litter ranger during litter picking!

Pupils advised that being part of the eco club has made them more conscious of littering issues outside of school, that they turn off lights more at home, they recycle more at home, and they walk and cycle more.

It was a delight to meet the eco committee members from Thomas a Becket – thank you for involving the E.Y.E Project to your eco club meeting!

The South Coast's First Offshore Wind Farm



The E.Y.E Project was invited by Rampion Offshore Wind to a reception at the Southern Pavillion on the Worthing Pier to mark a major construction milestone following the installation of all 116 wind turbines.

The event delivered the Rampion story to date, with video highlights of the wind farm construction, along with announcements of their £3.1 million community benefit fund which will be managed by Sussex Community Foundation, and a Visitor Centre that will be opening on the Brighton seafront in Summer/Autumn 2018.

Quick facts about the wind farm:

- 116 turbines installed these will start turning one by one over the next few weeks into the forthcoming months with completion in 2018.
- Turbine height to the blade tip is 140m with a foundation length of 60-80m
- 27km of buried onshore cables
- Offshore export cable length 16km
- One offshore substation
- Energy will be supplied to 350,000 UK homes annually
- 600,000 tonnes CO2 emissions saved per year



• The Rampion name was entered into by a schools' naming competition by Davison High School for Girls and went on to win the public vote. The logo is a stylised version of the Rampion flower, the County flower for Sussex.

Rampion has a new website <u>https://www.rampionoffshore.com/</u> which includes details of their community benefit fund and an education page with resources from Eon Energy Experience which includes a Primary resource 'Solar Oven', and a Secondary resource, 'Power on Mars'.

Running between 20/11/17 and 03/12/17, and now in its ninth year, Switch Off Fortnight provides teachers with curriculum-linked resources that get the whole school working together on a fun and rewarding activity which can help you achieve an Eco Schools Award.

Switch Off Fortnight is a good way to cut your school's energy bills. It can be led by a group of students and is designed to help you achieve an eco-school award.

It's completely up to you how involved you want to get - you could run a full fortnight of activities or simply introduce the topic with an assembly. Schools Sharing Section

This edition we have introduced a schools sharing section for schools to share eco information. This can also be used as a 'Q&A' section for schools seeking eco advice from other schools.

Bramber School, Worthing have shared that they took part in the Walk to School month 'As part of walk to school month our PE lead ran a school competition, getting children to walk to school. He even agreed to walk to school every day himself! Each class recorded their journeys; the winning class won a golden shoe! Our Reception - Year 4 classes are set up with Travel Tracker and will follow the scheme, collecting monthly badges. It has been a great incentive for the children. Our Gardening/ECO club is an hour every week after school. We have focused on improving and tidying our outdoor environment as well as creating bug hotels and bird feeders. This term we will be thinking about getting ready for winter and planting bulbs for spring.'

Holmbush Primary Academy, Shoreham are arranging an Eco stall at the Christmas fayre. They will be making and selling seed bombs (with donations of old seeds from parents), eco friendly reindeer food for Santa and also twig Christmas tree decorations. Their eco commitee have decided that they needed some litter rangers so they now have some from each class, and following on from a suggestion at the last E.Y.E Project Networking meeting, they are now meeting over a lunchtime so that they have extra time for discussions. The school eco rep has recommended three good books suitable for Primary. Details with descriptions from Amazon are as follows:

Carbon Monster by Katherine Wheatley: 'Carbon Monster is about a small boy who notices a tiny line of footprints following him. At first he does not know what or who they belong to until one day he spots a tiny creature behind him. The creature has a name. Its name is Carbon Monster. The monster follows George everywhere and gets bigger and bigger and bigger. George soon discovers the monster likes eating rubbish. The more rubbish George creates the bigger the monster gets. Finally, George decides to trick the monster and starts recycling, reusing and reducing his waste to avoid the huge, oily monster and his horrible slippery footprint. By reducing his waste George manages to shrink the size of the monster and learns that the size of Carbon Monster is down to him, just like a real carbon footprint.'

The World Came to My Place Today by Dr Jo Readman: 'The world really does come to visit George when his grandpa arrives, with a globe, to look after him and his sister for the day. Grandpa explains how everything from the cereal they eat for breakfast and the chocolate bars they love, to the rubber in their bicycle tyres and wood in their toys, come from plants all over the world.'
